A farmer sows seed in order to produce a $\underline{\mathsf{CROP}}$ – not to just see plants take root, but for them to be fruitful.

Note that this farmer in Jesus' parable was not "CONSERVATIVE" with His sowing of the seed — He threw it in places that weren't ready for it, leaving the results with the soil, not the absence of seed.
