1. Submission to authorities in your life isn't dependent on their fairness.

1 Peter 2:18-20

- 1st century slavery had some significant <u>differences</u>
 than what slavery would later look like.
- Old & New Testaments both <u>condemn</u> slave traders.

Exodus 21:16, 1 Timothy 1:9-10

 The New Testament writers addressed <u>slaves</u> who, presumably, had access to their letters and were encouraged to seek their freedom.



1 Corinthians 7:21-23

 In the 1st century church, both slaves and slave owners were instructed that they were fundamentally equal and accountable to God.

Ephesians 6:9

 As followers of Jesus, we're called to live in a <u>radical</u> way no matter what the circumstances.

Ephesians 6:5-8

From the leader of your country to the leader in your workplace to the leaders in your church, "God's in <u>control</u>".

But what's commendable before God?

- When you suffer for doing good & endure it.

Colossians 3:23-24

2. Jesus' suffering not only <u>pardoned</u> you, but provided a <u>pattern</u> for you.

1 Peter 2:21-24

As a follower of Jesus, you're expected to <u>follow</u> Jesus.

John 15:18-20

Jesus has left you a pattern, a <u>template</u> so that you not only would expect to suffer for doing good like He did, but you'd know <u>how</u> to suffer for doing good, like He did.

3. The <u>strength</u> of the sheep is in the <u>watch</u> of the Shepherd.

1 Peter 2:25
